Semi Annual Member Meeting

Meeting was called to order by President Leroy Pedersen January 23, 2022 via Zoom at 5:00 pm PST. 19 participants were online including all board members and secretary.

Minutes were approved from the annual meeting.

A profit and loss 2021 and 2020 comparison were reviewed for finance reports. 2020 was at a loss with the declined registrations and cost of switching to Associated Registry as well as not having a National Show and Sale. 2021 did end with a profit. Account balances are over \$30,000. Susie Skinner moved to approve; Bryan Allred seconded; Passed.

Mardy gave an update on 2022 Directory. Breeders need to get their ads into Mardy and confirm their information is correct on the current breeders list. An email will be sent out as well to all members with the directory ad information and pricing. As soon as everyone gets back, the directory can be completed. The goal is to have them done by April.

Committees gave a report next.

Junior Committee – Missy and Alicia Holtz gave a report for the Juniors. They just had a meeting the prior week and are looking into fundraising ideas.

Registration Committee – Julie Ward reported their had been \$6000 in revenues for registration after Associated Registry fees. She hadn't heard of any issues with Associated and asked the membership if they had any concerns.

Starter Flock – Scott Kilber reported he had been checking in with last year winner Coy Petersen every month or so and sounded like everything was going well. Looking towards 2022 Starter Flock, application had just been posted to the website. Nothing had substantially changed from lasts years. Press releases will be sent out in coming week, please share. A couple of breeders had already come forward with donations, but more are needed still.

Promotion Committee – Julie reported they had not met since last Nationals. The board had approved \$500 for advertising the association they had not utilized yet. One idea they did have was doing producer spotlights throughout the year. We're working on getting the website to have a page for each current member and this would correspond with that. The more information and pictures that are submitted to Mardy the better the spotlight will be.

Standards Committee – Bryan Allred reported there was nothing new happening to update the standards, but did discuss what was needed for the sifting committee at the upcoming Nationals. He and the hosting Montana Targhee Association were working toward to get a wide variety of individuals to help with the sifting. Hall of Fame Committee – Jeff Nevens said he and Jack McRae were working together to try to make sure no one had previously been overlooked that should have been recognized. They'll be compiling a list for each hosting committee to review.

NSIP committee – Jeff Nevens reported there was no update on the NSIP show rules, but he was working to get new traveling plaques. The Champion Ram had been filled up several years back and needs to be redone. They are also adding a Reserve Ram and Champion and Reserve Ewe traveling plaques. They're trying to go back in the records to go back as far as they can on the new plaques. The Montana Targhee Association has graciously agreed to cover the costs of all the new plaques.

Nominating Committee – Scott Kilber reported they are looking for more individuals to volunteer for this committee. This year Bryan Allred/West and Julie Ward/At large west are up for reelection. If anyone has a nomination, please start considering. One thing to also keep in mind is that the association may need its districts redone to better match location of the members. This will have to be a topic at upcoming Annual Meeting.

Minutes, cont'd.

2022 Show and Sale – Dylan Laverell reported they were making a lot of progress in planning. Schedule will be a little different going from Monday to Wednesday. Look at the upcoming newsletter for more detailed information and lodging options. One thing they are looking to add is a commercial wool show. Entries will need to be at least 50% Targhee and will be separate from the National Show. Idea is this will bring in more participants to the Show and Sale. They're also exploring the option to sell the fleeces to various college wool judging teams.

All American Show – Todd Taylor reported this year will be in Massachusetts and he had not received enough interest to make that trip from junior members, so there will not be a Targhee showing this year. Next year it is back in Madison, Wisconsin so will get back into it than.

A previous topic from the annual meeting was the goals of the association. Ideas had been thrown around, but no actual goals had been set. Julie asked for a long range plan that membership would like that would better serve out members to do more. Dylan reminded everyone the Board members are available to call with any ideas or suggestions you may have.

Dylan Laverell moved to adjourn the meeting. Jeff Nevens seconded. Passed.



Starter Flock Program


Application is now available on our website (ustargheesheep.org). Please help spread the word to eligible youth that would be a great addition to the Association. This will be the thirteenth year the Association has given away a Starter Flock to a deserving Youth. In the previous years, the generous members of the USTSA has awarded 17 starter flocks, totaling 555 head of sheep, and have also donated almost \$14,000 towards buyers credits for the award winners to purchase additional sheep at USTSA national sales.

The winner must be present to receive the flock and will be awarded one (1) ewe lamb, one (1) yearling ewe, and one (1) brood ewe donated by members of the USTSA. Each animal will be a USTSA registered animal, and at least QR in Scrapie Codon 171 genotype. The winner will also receive a \$150 credit for use toward purchase of additional animals at the 2022 national sale.

Save the Date: ASI Spring Trip

The American Sheep Industry Association's Spring Trip to Washington, D.C., is set for March 14-16. The annual gathering allows sheep producers to visit with members of Congress, as well as leaders at government agencies ranging from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Sheep producers interested in taking part in the Spring Trip should contact their state association leadership to begin the process. Participants will fly into the nation's capital on Monday, March 14, and visit with agency leaders the next morning. Congressional visits will follow that afternoon and into Wednesday. ASI will host a reception and BBQ on Wednesday evening. Participants will be joined at the reception by Congressional leaders and staff.
