2023 National Show & Sale - July 13-15th

The Wisconsin Targhee Sheep Association is honored to be hosting the 2023 USTSA National Show & Sale. It will be held July 13th through July 15th at the Morrison County Fair Grounds, in Little Falls, Minnesota.

Entry Forms and the Entry Brochure Booklet are now available for download on the USTSA website (www.ustargheesheep.org). Please review the booklet as it details all of the information, rules, and testing details consignors will need for a successful show and sale. Entry forms are due to Mardy by May 31st.

Exhibitors will be allowed to enter one ram with no ewe requirements. However, for each additional ram entry, <u>TWO</u> ewes must be entered. The sale committee reserves the right to limit numbers once entries are in to keep class sizes reasonable.

Wool entry is \$5 per fleece, with a two fleece limit per class. There is no need to tie your fleeces. Prepare the fleeces as normal, roll and place in clear plastic bags. Entries can be mailed if you are not able to attend the event but would like to enter the wool show. Arrangements can be made to send entries back.

Junior Show Requirements

See Entry Brochure for full set of rules. Reminder that all sheep entered need to be registered in exhibitors name or that of a family member. Please make sure you bring registration papers, health papers and proof of lice treatment for ALL junior show entries, including junior show only. All juniors MUST enter ahead of time with national show entries and be checked in on Wednesday during allotted check-in times to be eligible to show. Code of Conduct forms must be signed and turned in with entries or at the time of check-in. There will be NO EXCEPTIONS to this new rule. Nominations Open for American Lamb Board Members

Know someone who should be nominated for the American Lamb Board (ALB)? Board nominations must be submitted by certified nominating organizations and are due to the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service by May 5, 2023. The US Secretary of Agriculture appoints the board members. USDA is now soliciting nominations for these board positions to begin January 2024:

Producer with 100 or fewer lambs

Producer with more than 500 lambs

Feeder with 500 or fewer lambs

First handler

Seedstock

One of the producer representatives must be from Region I, east of the Mississippi River. The board positions for feeder, first handler and seedstock representatives are not limited to geographic location. Board members who have completed two consecutive 3-year terms are not eligible for reappointment to the ALB. Each vacant position is required to have a minimum of two nominations. Nominations should include: LP-84 "Nomination for Appointment to the Lamb Promotion, Research and Information Board" form

Form AD-755 Advisory Committee Membership Background Information (completed in its entirety and signed)

Form LP-13, Nominee's Agreement to Serve

Representation is desired from all aspects of the industry, including what USDA considers historically underserved communities. The nomination process will consider the diversity of the population served and the knowledge, skills and abilities of the members to serve a diverse population. The US Secretary of Agriculture will select individuals from the nominations.

Hello fellow NSIP Targhee members! For those who haven't heard, I was elected as the Targhee Breed Representative during the NSIP business meeting this year at ASI. I am very excited to represent the Targhee breed and learn more about this selection tool during my tenure on the executive committee.

Years of genetic selection coupled with twelve months of wool growth cumulate to an often-hectic day when sheep are shorn. Data is collected at a rapid pace, and then entered into Lambplan. But how often do we take time to look at data from year-to-year to see big picture strengths and traits to work on? Is our wool clip finer than it was five years ago? Have we seen a change in overall grease fleece weight? Do locks of wool exhibit long fibers with good character? These are all questions that should be asked to push your flock and the Targhee breed forward.

After traits are identified, using NSIP Estimated Breeding Values (EBVs) are a great tool to aide in selecting future replacements. EBVs for wool traits like Fiber Diameter (FD), Staple Length (SL), and Fleece Weight (YGFW) are major considerations when evaluating an individual's past or future performance. Producers should also be aware of percentile rankings for traits across all Targhees. To find this report open the online searchable database and click on "Reports" on the top left-hand corner, then select Targhee. Using this tool, producers should easily be able to find ranges and percentiles where individuals stand amongst others in the entire breed.

Let's evaluate Wool EBVs at the 2022 Montana Ram Sale. Table 1 references the minimum, maximum, and average EBV value that was listed for rams in the Targhee Breed along with the 50 percentile value from the NSIP Targhee Report. FD is expressed in microns, SL is expressed in millimeters and GFW is expressed as a percentage. If we evaluate the minimum FD EBV to the average EBV value, we can say that we would expect the minimum EBV ram to have a fleece that is 2 microns finer than the average ((-2.6) - (-0.6) = -2). All that needs to be done is divide this value by 2 to estimate progeny differences. So, we would expect the progeny from the minimum FD EBV ram to sire offspring that should be 1 micron finer than the average (-2/2=-1). Comparisons like this can be made for both SL and GFW.

NSIP is a valuable tool to have in your "toolbox," however not all traits have EBVs. Staple variation from shoulder to britch, fleece color, and belly wool are examples of traits that don't have EBVs, so visual evaluation of fleeces is still a crucial element to ensure overall fleece performance.

One way we evaluate wool at home is by collecting staples on lambs and yearlings the day before shearing when the sheep are home and close to our working facilities. This allows us to take a wool sample from the same spot on the mid-rib and evaluate variation from different parts of the sheep. Having time to thoroughly evaluate future replacements helps keep a more peaceful environment. Additionally, this helps make shearing less hectic because the only datapoint we need to record is fleece weight after the sheep is shorn.

Whether you are evaluating fiber diameter, staple length or fleece weight, recording data is the first step to make improvements to your wool clip. More information about fleece trait EBVs and all other EBVs that NSIP offers can be found on the NSIP website at www.nsip.org.

A Refresher of Targhee Standards

There has been discussion lately on Targhee standards, both from members and also brought to the attention of the Board. This is the time when many of us will be evaluating our flock for replacements and/or show entries. It seemed timely to write a "refresher" of Targhee Standards for all of us to follow when making these decisions. There are two references for members to look to in this regard. A Targhee Inspection Manual was last published in May 2014 with the help of Jack McRae, Darrell Deneke, and Dr Jeff Held. This manual was originally written in May 1992 with the input of numerous Targhee breeders, inspectors and university personnel nationwide. A good portion of this manual is also reprinted in the National Directory and Standards last printed in 2018. This article will not attempt to address all points in the manual, but a summary thereof. Members are encouraged to review this manual and, if not available, to contact Mardy for a copy. The directory is re-published every 3 years, so is up for renewal this year.

As stated in the inspection manual, the inspection process should include:

<u>Body and conformation</u>- A visual inspection from a distance so that views from front, side and rear may be secured to give an idea of size, balance, width and depth of body, covering of the head, straightness of legs, conformation and breed type. A Targhee ram should weigh between 200-300 pounds; a ewe 140-200 pounds. It is recommended only the top 1/3 of rams be registered unless there are one or more traits superior enough to benefit the breed. It is important to know what the Targhee breed type is because a Targhee does not equal another breed's strong points, eg. a Rambouillet's wool or a Columbia's size. Targhee Standards should be studied so that we do not try to make the Targhee fit another breed's standards.

What faults are not allowed if an animal is to be registered:

<u>Horns-</u> Not allowed but scurs that are not attached and less than one inch are acceptable if they can be easily removed. A polled depression is desirable.

<u>Jaw Irregularities</u>- An underbite or overbite not allowed. The teeth of the lower jaw should meet the upper jaw about the thickness of a quarter behind the upper jaw {1/4 inch}.

Inverted eyelids- Can cause blindness and are highly inheritable.

<u>Wrinkles on body-</u> No wrinkles on body, hind quarters or back. A few wrinkles on the neck are allowed as long as they do not continue above the neck. Wrinkles are highly inheritable also.

<u>Testicle deformities</u>- Testicles on mature rams must be at least 30 cm and of equal size. A split between the testicles of more than 1/3 is not acceptable. They should be free of lumps, hard spots, or epididymis.

<u>Faces</u> should have wool over the poll and down the forehead, not completely bare heads. There should be a channel from the lower eyelid to the muzzle of at least two fingers width to prevent wool blindness.

<u>Wool-</u> The staple length should be a minimum of 3 inches at 12 months of age. Ewes should produce 10 to 12 pounds of grease wool, rams 16 to 22 pounds of grease wool. Desirable micron is 22.05 to 24.94 micron (60's to 62'spinning count). The coarsest acceptable micron on the side is 26.39. Sheep finer than 22.05 are acceptable but only with sufficient staple length. Fleeces should not vary more than 2.8 microns {2 spinning counts} from side to britch. Fleeces should be dense, uniform, and attractive in character. There should be no off-color wool or belly wool above a line from the flank to the pit of the front leg. No black or brown color in the fleece is tolerated. Pigment on the face, ears, feet or lower legs is tolerated but only if no larger than a quarter. There should be no medulated fibers or kemp in the wool.

As per the directory "The Inspection Policy of the Association for registration is that animals must be examined by owners or official inspectors to meet Targhee standards. Many Targhee breeders have their ewes and rams examined by an official inspector in the belief that an unprejudiced opinion is best. It is recommended that new breeders have their flock examined by an official inspector to aid setting type and wool standards in the flock." There is a list of inspectors in the 2018 directory, which needs to be updated. But any experienced Targhee breeder can help with this process, maybe for a tank of gas and a meal. We encourage members to consider this outside opinion before registering animals.

We all believe in the tremendous attributes of our Targhee sheep. It is our responsibility to uphold the standards and integrity of the breed. Sometimes the decisions can be difficult, but they must be made for the good of the breed and the Association.

Future years the ewe lambs purchased in the sale will be able to come back and be shown as yearlings the following year and would be eligible for similar awards as they were as a ewe lamb. We are also working on setting up a program for progeny of the ewes sold through the sale to be eligible for the program as well but we are still working on details for that.
